Climate Migration

Forms of human violence such as persecution, terrorism and war can force people to flee their homes in order to stay safe, ultimately making them refugees. However, climate can also play a role and lead to climate migration. EI-Hinnawi defines climate refugees as "those people who have been forced to leave their traditional habitat, temporarily or permanently, because of a marked environmental disruption (natural and/or triggered by people) that jeopardize their existence and/or seriously affects the quality of their life".2


